Every week, Ouanda discovers a new animal from one of the protected areas in the Republic of Congo. She will share her adventures so that you too can discover the natural beauty of your country.


The activities are suitable for children from 3 to 12 years old. Participation of parents is recommended for younger children.

Ouanda is in the Odzala-Kokoua National Park, to find out more about the Western Lowland Gorilla.



When people visit the gorillas they must wear a mask to protect the gorillas from human diseases. Some diseases can affect both humans and gorillas.




10 METRES
